# Kinetic Response 

"Praying in Color" Intercessory Prayer
Sometimes when we pray, our minds wander. The website prayingincolor. com has lots of ideas for using your hands to pray (which can also help your mind and heart to stay focused). Here is one way to pray for other people:
1.Start with God. Write a name for God in the middle of the paper. Ask God to be part of your prayer. Draw or doodle around the name while you pray. Think of each stroke or dot as a prayer. If words come to you, pray them. If not, enjoy the silent time with God while you draw.
2. Write the name of someone for whom you want to pray. Start to draw around their name. Release the person into God's care. If words come to you, pray them. If not, just keep drawing.
3. When you are finished praying for the person, take a breath, say "Amen," or "Lord, hear my prayer."
4. Continue to add names and doodles to your page.
